There were 18 sloops on the line for the start, on a beautiful sailing day, certainly a lot different from the weather that areeted the fleet in Boothbay. The weather in Boothbay didn't put a damper on the occasion however. Despite the weather, it appeared that

everyone enjoyed themselves. It provided the opportunity for many of us to socialize with friends, enjoy our first ever predicted log race, and watch with enthusiasm, the model sloop races. 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Record Turnout for Marblehead Regatta

The Marblehead Regatta for 1990 was a contrast in weather changes. For instance, in spite of the weather guessers call for "strong southwesterlies throughout the weekend", Saturday morning delivered a light southeast breeze that had a hint of swinging to the southwest before becoming still lighter. With but a ten minute postponement to assemble the eighteen sloops that had gathered to form the two divisions, the starting gun was fired at exactly 10:20 AM just off the lighthouse, where lovers of Friendship Sloops had gathered to watch the proceedings. The sloops in Division I were given a triangular course (twice around) consisting of a total 11.4 NM, while the larger sloops in Division II were assigned a larger triangular course (also twice around) whose total turned out to be 15.4 NM. Government buoys were used for the turning marks in both divisions. The predicted (by the Race Committee, thank you) southwesterly did develop in time for both divisions to realize a beat on both times around, but the dying breeze and an approaching thundershower made for mighty slow going as some of the slower sloops in Division I approached the finish line. As it developed, all sloops in both divisions finished safely as the gathering squall passed innocently to the northeast.

The late afternoon clearing skies allowed us to have a delightful time in honoring the 75 year old **Eagle** (#53), when at the side float of the Corinthian Yacht Club, a suitably inscribed silver tray was presented on her behalf, to her skipper, Don Huston. The whole event was then washed down with a bottle or two of champagne.

Sunday Morning

The contrast in weather made an appearance at 6:00 AM when one of Don Kent's old fashioned "back door cold fronts" poured a stiff northeast wind right down the harbor, with gusts exceeding 35 knots and at times, heavy driving rain. The best guess was that it would ease off by noon, but it was going to be a tough shot to call as time was not in our favor if we were to present awards and get everyone enroute home by mid-afternoon. Still, consideration had to be given to the less experienced among us and at 9:30 AM when two cannon were fired and the "AP" was run up the flagpole, no one was visibly in disagreement. When by 11:30, conditions had not improved sufficiently to let us go for it, the decision was made to "bag it" for the day and make the awards presentation at 1:00 PM.

And so it was reluctantly, the regatta was based on one day of racing -- the first time in memory that we had to cut it short. Therefore, the awards were presently thusly:

The Festival Committee welcomed each boat into the harbor and showed them to a mooring, a likely boat with which to to raft or a good spot to anchor. The working boats were particularly careful on entering the mooring area. The Captain's meeting was followed by a windward-leeward race (no reaching!) for the smaller boats. A well attended fish fry followed the race and several of the old schooners had open house for the public.

Sunday saw the race between the big schooners and that evening all the crews were guests of the Coast Guard at the Coast Guard station followed by the Awards Ceremony and folk singing.

The Friendships finished the race as follows: Resolute, Tannis, Eagle, Noahsark, Ollie M., Safe Home and At Last. The entire affair was well handled by the Gloucester Schooner Committee and was one of the most enjoyable weekends of the year.

Fog Wrecks Havoc With Sloop Races

The following article was written by Nick Leadley and was published in the August 2nd edition of the Boothbay Register.

A thick Maine fog forced cancellation of the annual Friendship Sloop races scheduled for Tuesday, July 24, but the sloop captains braved the mists on Wednesday, July 25.

According to Race Committee Chairman Bruce Morang, a predicted log race was held on Wednesday, during which the sloop captains were required to holler an exact estimate as they crossed the starting line established by the Race Committee of the time it would take to sail from McKown Point, around Squirrel Island, and back to the starting line of McKown Point. Captain Bruce Lanning of Winter Harbor onboard **Schoodic** won the predicted log race.

"Only the best navigators came out for that race," stated Morang.

On Thursday, July 26, the fog lifted, but the race course had to be shortened due to lack of wind in the afternoon, yet the sloops competed in the only actually sailing race of the three day event. **Old Baldy**, owned by Jim Wilson, took first place honors in the small boat division, while Dave and Loretta Westphal of Key Largo, FLorida and West Southport onboard **Toddy**, took first place in the large boat division.

Despite the running of only one race, Morang stated that there was a bright point when the Friendship Sloop Society gained a number of small members. A group that sailed model Muscongus Bay sloops, a forerunner of the Friendship Sloop, in New York City's Central Park, gave a demonstration of the vessels for the captains of the larger sloops during Friendship Sloop Days. The owners decided to change the name of their twenty-inch vessels to Friendship Sloops, joined the Friendship Sloop Society, and made a donation to the Society's scholarship fund.

"They had a marvelous time," said Morang of the model sloop owners, "and are a welcome addition (to the Friendship Sloop Society)."

Morang added in closing that the Boothbay Harbor Yacht Club was owed thanks for a marvelous job of hosting the captains and their sloops during the 30th annual Friendship Sloop Days.

Model Sloops Compete at Boothbay

Ed. Note: This year the Sloop Society sponsored racing of radio controlled Muscongus Bay Sloops at the annual regatta in Boothbay. There were five model yachts competing in the regatta: three from the Central Park Model Yacht Club of New York City, Ed Childs of Longmeadow, Mass. and Commodore John Wojcik. Everyone, spectators and participants, had a great time. Spectators were given the opportunity to sail a model yacht during the evening. The following articles is from the Annual Friendship Issue of Masthead, the newsletter of the CPMYC. We hope to make this an annual event at Boothbay, and encourage you to consider building a model during the upcoming winter.

Model yachting and full size yachting co-existed and complimented one another nicely at Boothbay Harbor last week when the Friendship Sloop Society held their 30th Annual Regatta. The event, affected by fog and low winds, turned out to be a great deal of fun. Members of the Central Park Model Yacht Club offered an on water demonstration regatta, complete with full pageantry (and a keen appreciation by all in attendance). Many past and present Friendship owners, some who have passed their craft on to a family member or friend due to the daily difficulties of maintaining a full sized Friendship, showed extreme interest. Many expressed a desire to be in the first twenty to be presented to the American Model Yachting Association as a proposed "Friendship Class".

Leo Campbell, a race committee member, and previous owner of the Albion Morse "Muscongus", says that he plans to get a winch and start building a hull very soon.

Many youngsters were very excited about the models, especially on the Thursday evening after the BBQ when CPMYC turned the controls over to the youths and let them race. The great breezes and little amount of seaweed sure made them look good....so good that we've been challenged by several locals next year. These folks studied our boats thoroughly (and you can expect for good reason). This class has developed, as has my eye for lines and sail trim while sailing on **Endeavor** during the only race on Thursday. My opinion that a separate jib(s) control will move this class to greater participation (remember Frank Lusk had it first), was agreed upon by many, almost as many who asked why we hang our lead so low!

Our club involvement with this 30th annual regatta was awarded, appreciated, and we were welcomed back. We offered a positive avenue for skippers to compete, learn, and enjoy while on shore, the boats they, and we, love and live with. The possibilities of the older teaching their younger members via modeling, the ability to reproduce your full sized yacht in Friendship Class scale, and the wonderment and amusement of the spectators goes a long way in the Friendship tradition.

Our team from CPMYC was fully recognized and awarded during the awards ceremony, with each skipper receiving an embroidered tote bag and a brass plaque commemorating the regatta for attachment to the boat bulkhead. The incredible warmth and good will extended to our members by the skippers, their families, their crew, and by the Boothbay Harbor Yacht Club, made us all feel that we are truly a part of the Friendship family. You can be assurred that we will go back to encourage the sport of model yacht racing, however, not for demonstration....but to race with the best!!!

Notes: Anyone interested in registering their Friendship or similar boat with the proposed Friendship class within the American Model Yachting Association, should first join the AMYA and then send me a letter of desire to pledge for a Friendship class.

Our class guideline, at this point, require a 27" waterline, wood construction, and certain other requirements, which are available on request. More developments are in the works to include more types of early Friendships than the currently endorsed Laughing Whale 46" Muscongus kit.





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


The Elizabeth Jane sailing along in New London harbor.




Donald Duncan, Sloop Society piper, at the memorial service in Friendship.



The **Rita**, owned by Frank Snyder at New London. That's the Noank Wooden Boat Burgee flying from the committee boat.




The crowd gathers at the Sloop Society flagpole in Friendship for the Sunday morning memorial service.









Fog Frustrates Friendships

followed by a shoreside lobster bake hosted by Connie and Elbert Pratt and Bill and Caroline Zuber.

Then the fog came on, and not on "little cat feet" as Carl Sandburg would have you believe. This was industrial-strength fog, and it bottled the Friendship fleet in Boothbay from Monday to Thursday. Tuesday's race had to be abandoned due to the miasma, but Wednesday was salvaged when Vice Commodore Bill Rand came up with a predicted log race from McKown Point through the gloom to Squirrel Island (if you could find it) and back. The Skippers' challenge was to hail the Race Committee's

Dragon Lady with a predicted time for the course before they started. Since we may again resort to this watery hooliganism if the weather dictates, following are the results of this five mile run: Schoodic, just 55 seconds earlier than her predicted time; Banshee who was 1:34 late; Knee Deep (which left the mooring without her spars, and may not even be a member of the Society) finished 2:04 early; Tannis was 2:37 early; Gladiator was 2:52 early; William Rand (pushed by her shore boat which was propelled by a rice-powered engine) was 5:15 earlier than predicted; Sarah Meade was 5:47 early; **Anna B.** was 10:29 early; and Voyager II was 10:38 early.

By Thursday, it lightened up enough so that we could set a starting line, and we posted a twice around Handicap Alley course around Squirrel Island and into Fishermen's Passage. after the "go" gun, the fog shut down again, and many of the more discriminatory skippers radioed us they were packing it in and coming home. Those that stayed on the course, however, took well over four hours to grope their way around the marks with the Division I winner, Old Baldy, finishing in 4:38, and no one in Division Il was able to finish within the five-hour limit, and we finished them where they lay at 4:45.

Fog accepted and for the record, the trophy list can be found on Page 4.

And you have every right to ask what it is the Race Committee does waiting for the fleet to grope its way home on foggy days. Well, we make the best of it. Marcia serves us Brie on delightful little Danish crackers, and George Pew reads aloud to us from Elizabeth Barrett Browning's "Confessions".
