#### Update on the new Friendship Sloop Book

The new Friendship Sloop Book is well underway. The Book Committee has met several times since the start of the year and has mapped out the chapter outlines for the first part of the book, covering the history of Friendship sloops and the Friendship Sloop Society. The first chapter has been written, edited, rewritten, been reviewed and is being revised again. Chapters Two through Four have partial drafts and research is continuing to make this history as complete as we can make it in the space of one book.

In addition to the content for Part I, the Book Committee has been collecting information on individual sloops for Part II of the book - the Catalog of Sloops. A mailing went out in March to all sloop owners (that we know about) with a form requesting confirmation of details of individual sloops, such as length on deck, beam, year launched, builder, and other specific, and non-specific details about each sloop registered with the Society. The mailing was followed a month later by a mass e-mail asking owners to follow up with us and send in their forms. To date we have had 45 sloop owners contact us with forms, pictures and further information about their sloops. We also know about several owners who intend to send us information but are involved in domestic disputes over which pictures to send. We understand. Just work it out and let us know.

If you are a sloop owner, and you did not receive a form, or the cat ate it, you can fill out a form on line by going to the Friendship Sloop website home page (www.FSS.org) and clicking on the link Progress on the new Friendship Sloop book & how to electronically submit your sloop's information.

The link will take you to a page with more information and sample pages from the new book. It will also take you to the on line form that you can fill out and submit electronically. If you do not like computers, you can contact Ted Walsh directly at the address below, and he can send you a blank form. We want to include every sloop — even if it has not left the garage for ten years.

Several members of the Book Committee will be at the Southwest Harbor Rendezvous, blank forms in hand, looking to track down information on individual sloops.

In Rockland, the Book Committee will have a small table under the tent with a rough mockup of the book so attendees at Rockland can see first hand what the book will look like. As in Southwest Harbor, blank sloop forms will be available as we make every effort to reach every sloop owner.

#### **Rockland Race Course News**

The 2012-2013 winter deliberations by your Executive and Race Committees have produced an attempt to alleviate the traffic-jams that have so frequently occurred in Handicap Alley at Rockland.

This year, we will be starting three divisions in the following sequence as taken from the 2013 Sailing Instructions:

	Starting Sequence

30	Warning: Division II	Yellow	
25	Preparatory: Division II	Blue	
20	Start: Division II	Red	
15	Preparatory: Division I	Blue	
10	Start: Division I	Red	
5	Preparatory: Cruising	Blue	
0	Start: Cruising	Red	

Of the three starting divisions, only Division II and I will honor Handicap Alley, with the Cruising Division by-passing it entirely.

Then, as an aid to those using the Alley, we have significantly widened the distance between the entrance buoys G-1 and G-2. Here, the new coordinates have been posted on the 2013 course chart.

A final word concerning the chart - - - aside from being informational only (and not to be used for navigation) this is the "official" chart that shall be issued to all skippers at the Skippers' Meeting under the tent at Rockland. ALL previous charts should be discarded and must not be used for the 2013 race program at Rockland.

#### **Two FSS Members to be Honored**

On Wednesday evening, June 26th, Harold Burnham and Ralph Stanley will be honored by the USS Constitution Museum at the Charlestown Navy Yard in Boston when they will be presented the 2013 Don Turner Award. The award is presented annually to honor the name of Don Turner, former head of the USS Constitution Maintenance and Repair Facility, for his singular contribution toward the preservation of "Old Ironsides" and the skills that built her, as well as his knowledge of and dedication to the ancient art of shipbuilding, and to recognize others who are similarly dedicated to maritime preservation and advances in ship construction and design. The Don Turner Award is made annually to a person or team of people, professional or amateur, who have contributed significantly to efforts to preserve important vessels or who have made significant contributions to our knowledge and understanding of ship design and construction.

Through the efforts of Dave Graham, an Overseer at the USS Constitution Museum, arrangements have been made for free admission to be granted to the first 12 FSS members who respond with a request to our Commodore, Bill Whitney, to attend the presentation ceremonies, with light fare, under a tent alongside the USS Constitution. #### Willis H. Collyer

Will was a longtime member of the Sloop Society and was the former owner of #97 Gannett (now Integrity)

Willis H. Collyer, age 91, of Mattapoisett, passed away peacefully on Tuesday, March 19, 2013, at Our Lady's Haven in Fairhaven, MA after a long illness. He was the husband of the late Barbara R. "Bobi" (Walker) Collyer.

Born and raised in Marblehead, MA, Willis was the son of the late Ernest L. and Corinne (Lindsey) Collyer. He had resided in Mattapoisett since 1956. He was a member of the Mattapoisett Congregational Church.

He graduated from Marblehead High School and later went on to receive an associate degree in Criminal Justice from Northeastern University.

Growing up in Marblehead, loving anything marine and water related, he began work at Graves Yacht Yard, and crewed on the classic one-designs of the day, including "J," "Q," and "S" boats, as well as 110's and 210's. He later worked at the Marblehead Transportation Co., and served as waterfront Steward of both the Eastern Yacht Club and Boston Yacht Club.

Will was a proud Coast Guard veteran of World War II, enlisting in 1939. He first served as a gunner in North Atlantic convoy duty aboard the 125' cutter **Travis**. Later in the war he served in the Pacific Theater aboard the cutter **Taney**. He was Chief Gunner's Mate when he participated in the invasions of Okinawa and Tokyo. He remained very active in **Taney** reunion activities, visiting the ship enshrined in Baltimore on many recent Pearl Harbor Days.

Will began his career as a National Resource Officer and patrol boat captain in 1955, retiring as supervisor of Massachusetts marine environmental law enforcement in 1986. On his early "off duty" days, he was employed by Brownell Boat Yard, Edwin L. Perkins Co. and Joseph Luiz Contractors at various times, instilling a much respected strong work ethic in his three sons.

Willis was very active, independent and "sharp as a tack" throughout his later years, kept busy maintaining his own home, furniture making and of course following the activities of his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Regular drive-throughs of the Mattapoisett Boatyard, the town wharf and visits with his friends for coffee filled his days.

He is survived by his sons, Michael L. Collyer and his wife, Jacqueline, and Craig W. Collyer and his wife, Joanne, both of Mattapoisett, and his daughter-in-law, Jennifer M. Collyer of Fairhaven; numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Willis was the father of his much beloved youngest son, the late Karl M. Collyer.

#### **Cruise Down East to the 53rd**

Cruising in company with other sloops is a safe way to make the voyage to the 53rd Homecoming in Rockland, especially if this may be your first extended cruise. Not only is it safer, it also can be a lot of fun.

Again this year a cruise is planned to leave Buzzards Bay. Current plans are to rendezvous on the night of Saturday, June 29th at the mooring area on the north side of Bassett's Island by Wings Neck at Cataumet. Currently there are three sloops planning to meet that afternoon: Bill Whitney with **Gaivota**, John Wojcik with **Banshee** and Laurie Raymond onboard her sloop **Hegira**.

The planned itinerary is to depart Bassett's Island at 8:00 AM on Sunday and pass through the Cape Cod Canal with the fair tide. The destination for that day is Scituate. The following day the "fleet" will head to Cape Ann and anchor in Folly Cove on the north side of Cape Ann. Wednesday's objective will probably be Cape Porpoise Harbor since it's generally uncrowded and is a good anchorage. The cruise will then continue to the Portland area and will attempt to spend the night at Jewell Island or Cliff Island in Casco Bay. The schedule after that day will be flexible depending on the wishes of the crews and of course the weather.

## Information Requested - Sloop <u>Annie O</u>

The registrar received the following email from David Franke requesting information on the sloop **Annie O**. If you know of this sloop, please contact David directly.

I am researching my relatives Joseph E. Butler and William F. Butler. Is there any truth to the tales told in Nelson Webber's booklets regarding a Friendship Sloop named **Annie O**? I was hoping that **Annie O** would appear in the Friendship Sloop Registry. I note that there have been several McClains who built Friendship Sloops, but found no **Annie O** in the registry. Was it just too old a vessel to have been listed? See reference material below, which put me on this search.

Many thanks for any assistance you may be able to give.

From the booklet by Nelson Webber, "Bremen, Maine" #12 page 32 a list of shipbuilders:

"Will Butler 1875-1956? born on Shore Road, Bremen was a Grand Banks fisherman most of his life He retired to Bremen and built many sailing models of local Coasters and Schooners which he gave to the children, many little boys had fun sailing them at Muscongus Harbour."

*Nelson Webber material [copied as it appears, complete with misspellings]:* 

"William Butler and his father Joe lived on Bremens shore road, they owned a large Friendship Sloop "Annie O." built by "Bugs Mclain" and made their living fishing for Halibut as far north as "Sable Island" off Nova Scotia, until about 1930 when they sailed into Friendship Harbour, moored their Sloop and walked to Bremen on the ice of Muscongus Bay, to retire at Muscongus Harbour. Will became Captain of another Sloop owned by the Coolidge family of Bremen and took out many fishing parties. He also carved and whittled many models of sloops, Coasters, Schooners and dories."

## Information Requested - Sloop Eda L. Morse

The **Eda J Morse** was built by Wilbur Morse in Friendship and launched in 1891. The sloop is named after his daughter who was 13 years old at the time. John's father was Captain Dan Mullins who owned a number of fishing boats out of New Bedford, Mass, one of the boats being the **Eda J Morse** which he owned early in the last century.

John is researching the history of his father's fishing vessels, and has inquired if any member of the Society knows the history of the **Eda J Morse**.
