### Saturday - July 24th - Sail up the Kennebec to the Maine Maritime Museum

**11 AM** - Meet at Fort Popham. Flood tide begins at 11:45. The Museum has promised a moderate SW breeze, gentle temperatures, no precipitation and no green heads

**5-5:30 PM** - The Bath Iron Works is launching the Aegis Destroyer **Paul Hamilton**. I'm told the place to watch this event is from the river if you don't mind missing all the speechifying on shore.

**6:15 PM** - We're all invited to the BIW reception at the MMM honoring the launching of the **Paul Hamilton**. The Navy folks will be wearing their dress blues (or whites). Bring yours if you have them, otherwise a recent shower and shave would be appreciated. - Speaking of showers, one will be available to us. This is certainly welcome news. The Commodore will be piloting the garvey again this year to get you to and from the shore. He says that he'll have **both** green and white touch-up paint on board.

### Sunday - July 25th - "Sundae" at the Museum

- The Museum is putting on a Victorian weekend with straw hats and bowlers, lawn-games, ice cream sundaes and "sauntering". I'm told that "sauntering" is walking around showing off your Sunday finest. The main attraction of this event is that centerpiece of the gay '90's; the Friendship Sloop.

12:30 PM or so - Parade of Sail / Low slack. We'll "saunter" up-river to the bridge, turn around, and sail past the BIW back to the Museum. shortcake for desert and tea and coffee. The price is \$17.00 per adult. A child's menu is a new addition this year and the charge is \$5.00 each. There will be macaroni and cheese and hotdogs available on the buffet for the kids. We haven't set an age limit for determining who's a kid, but the Executive Committee suggested that we charge double the adult price for 13 year olds! A cash bar is available starting at 5:30 PM and dinner will be at 6:30 PM. Please make your reservations early and bring the entire family.

In addition to the dinner being at the Newagen Inn we have also negotiated a favorable room rate for people who want hot showers, cooked meals, a queen size bed, and this within sound of the Cuckolds Lighthouse. Rooms are \$65.00 per couple, per night (two night minimum), and this includes a private bath, one queen size and one twin bed. represents a 30% discount and includes all taxes as well as a bountiful breakfast buffet of pancakes, danish, cereal fruit, etc. Children, staying in the same room, will be \$5.00 per night up to age 5 and \$10.00 for older children. It also boasts the largest saltwater swimming pool on the east coast as well as a heated freshwater pool. Mike Hinsley has sent along this letter, dated in February, to update us on the progress of the rebuilding of #97 Gannett.

About this time last year Tom Miller started the rebuilding of the sloop **Gannett** (27') - built in 1903. Great progress has been made and she now has new ribs, planking, ceiling and come to think of it just about new everything. The iron sail has been overhauled, all 450 pounds of it, and using a temporary gantry, lowered back into the hull. Needless to say this evolution had its moments and Tom has aged 10 years.

The deck is being worked on and it is now starting to look like a boat again. We had hoped to get her afloat this year but this would have meant rushing to get her finished, so reluctantly we have changed the plans to a 1994 launching. This year's sailing will be in my plastic bathtub, a Hunter 23'! Visitors are welcome, particularly if they are prepared to help cast 1800 pounds of lead ballast.

### **Executive Board Meeting**

The Spring meeting of the Executive Board was held on March 27th at the Maine Maritime Museum. There were 17 members present at the meeting which Jim Wilson called to order at 11:20 AM.

FSS Secretary Caroline Cronin presented the membership status as follows: Boatowners - 95, Associates - 35, Co-Operative - 29, Honorary - 9. Although the membership number is low, Caroline stated that she is in the process of sending out reminders to those members who have not paid their 1993 dues.

Treasurer David Bell presented the financial report which showed a balance of: Checking - \$385.25, Savings - \$1954.32, and Trophy CD - \$2000.

David discussed whether to keep the general insurance. Bernard MacKenzie thought that to keep it was redundant. A motion was put forth and voted unanimously not to renew the current insurance policy through Ladd's. Roger Duncan suggested that someone discuss the liability aspect with member Bob Stein who is a lawyer. If the insurance is needed, then the committee can vote to reinstate the policy. The board also voted to add \$50 to Other Administrative Expenses to cover insurance riders taken out for each of the Society's events.

David reminded the committee that the \$400 in the Trophy Account is for the purchase of keeper-trophies given out each year. During this discussion, Bob Rex mentioned that the Society needs a new State of Maine Trophy and a new Commodore's Trophy. Bob Monk said that he would approach the Maritime Museum Apprenticeshop about making a new Commodore's Trophy. The committee also decided to ask Ralph Stanley to build the State of Maine Trophy and therefore voted unanimously to budget \$500 to cover the cost of the trophy.

Bob Rex mentioned the U.S. Sailing Association insurance coverage and the board agreed to change the regatta entry form to indicate coverage for U.S. Sailing members and non-members.

Jim Wilson mentioned eliminating the skipper gifts and presentations from the budget in order to save money. John Wojcik and Roger suggested selling caps or other items to the skippers and their crew. Roger made a motion, and it was voted unanimously to drop the gift account from \$550 to \$350 and eliminate the skippers gifts.

Rich Langton mentioned that he would check with Downeast Embroidery for prices of hats and canvas bags to sell at the regatta.

Bob Rex announced that George Pew has again offered the **Dragon Lady** as the race committee boat for the 1993 regatta.

### Other budget discussions:

Roger stated that the Society would not have to pay the

\$900 to Reade Brower, publisher of the yearbook, because of the number of ads and the amount of money the Society has raised for the 1993 yearbook.

Doug Amsbary, membership chairman, stated that he needs \$200 - \$300 to cover all his expenses for the year. The board voted to place \$250 into the Membership Committee account for 1993.

**Pendleton Scholarship Fund:** Dave Bell reported that there was \$150 in donations to date. He also mentioned that he transferred the CDs that came due to the Putnam Government Trust (a mutual fund). David indicated that there could possibly be \$4000 given out in scholarships this June depending on the number of applications the scholarship fund receives.

**Newsletter:** John stated that the last newsletter was poorly mailed with some newsletters getting lost in the mail and others with no insides. The next edition will be taped instead of stapled to see if that will work better. John is looking for ideas for the newsletter. The next newsletter will go out around June 15th.

**Yearbook:** Roger reported that Crystal, who sells the ads for the publisher, has been receiving a lot of ads from all over the country. The yearbook has received more than enough ads to cover the expense of publishing the 1993 edition. Roger stated that he is looking for an article about Sail 92 in Boston, and that the yearbook should be published and distributed around the 15th of June.

**Publicity Committee:** Bob Monk stated that he sent a letter to WoodenBoat with the mailing list for the WoodenBoat Register, and that WoodenBoat had sent him a letter of thanks and reassured him that they would not sell the mailing list.

Bob said that he had sent a calendar of events and a cover letter to 25 organizations that Doug Amsbary had put together in 1992. Bob also sent a letter to the "Boston Globe" with a yearbook with the hope of getting an article printed about the Society and Friendship Sloops.

**Old Business:** Andrea Wilson mentioned that the new burgees have been received and the board voted to increase the price from \$10 to \$20 for a small, and from \$15 to \$25 for a large. The board also voted that the proper way to fly the burgee was with the first leaf up.

Constitution Update: Bill Rand discussed that he had updated the constitution for the board's approval. Bill reminded the board that this was just a draft of the final constitution and that he was open to changes and suggestions from the board. Jim stated that any changes in the constitution will be voted on by the board at the October meeting and voted by the members at the Annual Meeting. The board then discussed the suggested changes. At this time, Bill said that he would make changes suggested by the board and have a second copy for the October meeting. Jim stated that the board would have an informal meeting in Boothbay to finalize the constitution.

## "Coastal Maine: A Maritime History"

This literary review, written by Earl Brechlin, appeared in the December 17th edition of the "Bar Harbor Times".

If you could have a single volume of Maine coastal lore in your library, this is the one to have. Granted, that is a pretty glowing statement, but then this is a book that has been long overdue.

For years, students of history and lovers of Down East Maine have been forced to consult a wide variety of scholarly, and often times dry, books in order to learn about the past. But in "Coastal Maine: A Maritime History", Duncan does all that for you. He has meticulously combed the existing literature, combined it with individual interviews and a few passages (clearly marked as such) of artistic fiction to make one good read.

Chapters range from the first inhabitants and early explorers to the days of colonial settlement, the Revolutionary and Civil wars, World Wars I and II, the fishing industry, and the boat-building industry.

Here you can read about the lives of the earliest settlers on windswept Damariscove Island in the 1600's and the burning of Falmouth (Portland) by the British in 1775. Meanwhile, down the coast, the first naval battle of the war was being fought off Machias.

The role of Maine ships and crews in privateering; the importance of coastal commerce to the timber and ice industries; the design, record-setting passages, and construction of Maine's famous clipper ships and other vessels are also included.

Dudley Saltonstall's botched mission to take Castine and Benedict Arnold's ill-fated overland expedition to attack Quebec are also touched upon.

Several chapters are devoted to the many coastal steamers that once provided the most vital transportation links of their day.

Mount Desert Island readers in particular will find plenty to love about his book. From the first settlement by Jesuits near Southwest Harbor, to Revolutionary War action by Cranberry Islanders, visits by Samuel de Champlain, Captain John Smith and

others, the area's rich history unfolds in these pages. Contemporary history is illuminated, as well, including the landing of German spies at Hancock during WW II, the downing of a navy dirigible off Mount Desert Rock, and more.

Fabbri's marvelous Radio NBD on Otter Cliffs, the grounding of the steamship **Norumbega** on Clark Point in Southwest Harbor, and other events make interesting reading.

The later chapters of the book are devoted to fisheries and boatbuilding, both subjects of intense local interest. Duncan interviews E. Farnham Butler of Mount Desert on several topics and notes in the book that he wishes he could have used more of the wealth of material Butler supplied.

Much credit goes to Duncan's instinctive ability to include just the right amount of information without becoming bogged down in too many details. His anecdotal style flows easily. The way in which the information is separated, both chronologically and by subject, makes this a great book to keep handy for whenever a few extra minutes to spend by the woodstove crop up.

Each chapter includes a generous supply of footnotes which give proper credit to those whose scholarly works Duncan draws upon. The bibliography is a valuable resource.

The many excellent drawings, reproductions of maps, tables of information, and smattering of photographs keep this work graphically interesting as well.

With John Ware, Duncan continually edits and revises his father's definitive "A Cruising Guide to the New England Coast". A resident of East Boothbay, he is also the author of "Sailing in the Fog". With "Coastal Maine: A Maritime History", he aptly shows he is at home in Down East Maine's past as he is in the present.
