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### The Races at Marblehead

One of my winter projects this season has been the refurbishment of the Ridgway Trophy that hangs on the wall at Corinthian during the summer months. Initially presented in 1976, the trophy was beginning to look a little tired. But the real reason for undertaking the project was simply that Erica Beck's capturing of the trophy in 1999, filled up the 24th and remaining brass plate that the trophy had originally contained. The upshot of it all is that I am delighted to report that with an additional 20 plates and the rearranging of the originals, the Ridgway Trophy is now an even more handsome, eye-appealing presentation than when brand new out of the box!

While doing the project, I became engrossed once more on who had won the trophy over the years it has been presented and for those who won it more than once - - - how many times that may have happened. As you might have guessed, the results were not startling; that is, **Phoenix** came out on top with 9 victories, while **Tannis** ran close behind with a total of 8. It has been the usually light airs of mid-August that have looked kindly on these two contenders over the years; still they have by no means captured every race. **Voyager** has twice taken home first prize and there were even two back-to-back years of '87 and '88, when little **Philia** did the good deed. Single regatta wins have gone to **Old Baldy** in 1989 and **Liberty** back in 1984. And who among us that were there in 1983 will ever forget the heavy air weekend when more bare-bottom paint was exposed at the finish line than were topsides? That was when **Schoodic** won it all.

While the Ridgway winners are a matter of record, the "rest of the story" can only be told by looking at just how closely the margins were for some of the victors, against their first runner-up. Here is where some of the old behind-the-scene records paint a story - - - a few extra seconds here and a few there, and an entirely different outcome might have been the result.

All this is to say that while **Phoenix** and **Tannis** have been the Ridgway Trophy giants over the years, there are simply no hard and fast advance guarantees that any specific entry will be in for a happy time at the winning line of a FSS Marblehead gathering.

# Pendleton Memorial Scholarship Fund of the Friendship Sloop Society

The Friendship Sloop Society through its Pendleton Memorial Scholarship Fund continues to offer scholarships to the young people of Friendship who are graduating from high school in June. Additional funds are also granted to those who are currently continuing their programs in college or technical school.

In 1983 Elbert Pratt and other folks from the Sloop Society founded this fund specifically for the students from Friendship as a thanks for sharing the town and its heritage of beautiful boats and hard working people. Since that time, more than one hundred young people have been helped with funds raised from the efforts of many involved over the years; selling peanuts, having sales of homemade goods on the wharf, auctions at sloop meetings, collections of bottles and cans at the sloop races, and many donations from townspeople sloop owners and crews, and friends. It all adds up to a lot more than money!

In 1999, a total of \$4,850 was awarded to 12 students. The seven first- year recipients of \$600 each were:

Income received during 1999 totaled \$5,928.74. The value of the principal of the Scholarship Fund as of November 30, 1999 was \$72,377.92.


## **Memorial Book**

# Memorial Service Friendship Harbor - July 31, 1999

A beautiful sunny, breezy morning followed the foggy Friday. The official piper of the Society, Donald Duncan, was on hand to start and end the simple service. Retired minister David Bell led the larger than usual group in remembrances of those who had gone before. The service brought together the families of three of our members who have "crossed the bar" in recent months: Bill Rand, Bob Lash,, and Al Beck. As Priscilla Rand wrote in a note to me: "That was a wonderful event in Friendship last weekend. I hadn't been back for several years and was really touched to be in those waters and in the village again ... The Service at "The Rock" meant a great deal. David always finds just the right words. ..(he) very thoughtfully sent me the poem he read. He keeps a remarkable collection. With all the delightful new babies in our midst, it did seem that "the bridge" is already well traveled."

The poem to which she referred was "The Bridge Builder" by Will Allen Dromgoole. I include it here.

An old man going a lone highway
Came in the evening cold and gray
To a chasm vast and deep and wide,
The old man crossed in the twilight dim,
The sullen stream had no fears for him,
But he stopped when safe on the other side
And built a bridge to span the tide.

"Old man, " said a fellow pilgrim near,

### **Elbert Pratt**

Elbert Pratt passed away in January. He was a charter member of the Society, our cannoneer, and past president of the Pendleton Scholarship Fund. The following dedication appears in the Town of Friendship town report:

Elbert Sewell Pratt was born in Farmington, Maine on July 31,1917. He was the son of Dr. Harold and Cora Chase Pratt. Elbert and Constance Logan were married in 1943, and shortly thereafter he was sent overseas to New Guinea to serve with the U.S. Army Medical Corps. Elbert was a graduate of the University of Maine and taught Geology at Upsala College in NJ for 28 years. During the summers, he and Connie came to the "summer cottage" on Davis Point overlooking the Friendship Harbor entrance. Retirement in 1977 brought the Pratts home permanently to Friendship. Elbert was a charter member of the Friendship Sloop Society, the Official Cannoneer, and a founding trustee of the Pendleton Memorial Scholarship fund. This fund was created to benefit students from Friendship in their quest for higher education or training after high school. As President of the Scholarship fund for many years, Elbert gave many of our young folks the help needed to become productive citizens. Always helpful and forever the gentleman, Elbert will be sorely missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing him.

## **Bob Stein**

Robert M. Stein of Newbury, Mass. passed away on November 19, 1999. Bob was the father of Irene Amsbary. He was the former owner of the Pemaquid Sloop **Essential** (#178) and frequently crewed at the homecoming races onboard **Dictator**, **Phoenix** and **Departure**. # FRIENDSHIP SLOOP SOCIETY ANNUAL MEETING

Commodore Tad Beck opened the meeting at 4:00 p.m. In his opening remarks he stated that the Society was heading into it's 40th year, and that he was amazed that everyone is still enjoying the Society and the Society is growing stronger with the years. Tad then introduced the members of the executive board in attendance and new members.

Tad then stated that he had a questionnaire about the annual meeting and the other events within the Society. He asked that everyone fill one out so that it would give the executive board some direction as far as what people would or would not like to see as the Society moves ahead in the future.

### **SECRETARY'S REPORT**: Caroline Phillips

Membership for 1999 was as follows:

Boat owner: 94
Full/associate: 53
Cooperative: 21
Honorary: 7
TOTAL Membership: 175

Caroline reported that although these numbers were considerably lower than previous years, she seemed to think that the numbers would return to the 200's in year 2000. She already had 16 members who did not join in 1999, join in 2000 - 6 of them paid for 1999 as well. Six members have asked to be dropped from the mailing list in 1999 due to illness or they have sold their boat.

## TREASURER'S REPORT: David Bell (See Page 3)

David stated that all the figures were listed in his financial reports. He said that the Society is floating well!! He then stated that if anyone had any questions about the reports were welcome to ask him.

### PENDLETON SCHOLARSHIP FUND: Bill Zuber

Bill stated that the scholarship fund was doing fine. The fund has a principal balance of \$73,000. The scholarship fund awarded \$5,000 in scholarships last June -- 5 new students and 3 ongoing students.

### FRIENDSHIP DAYS: Bill Zuber

Bill began by saying that there was a lot of FOG!! He stated that 11 sloops and **Messing About** had signed up to sail to Friendship. Because of the FOG, only 4 Friendships and **Messing About** were able to sail to Friendship. All the other sloopers and crew drove over land. The event raised \$350 for the Scholarship Fund. Bill then stated that David Bell led the Memorial Service which honored all the deceased members with the newest to the list - Bill Rand, Bob Lash and Al Beck. Caroline Zuber then read a poem to the membership that was read at the memorial service.

## The Nickerson Trophy

A magnificent silver two handled trophy mounted on a wood base, this trophy was donated by Leon Nickerson, who served as race committee chairman of the first regatta in 1961. The first recipient in 1971 was Bruce White aboard his dad's sloop #59, Sarah Meade, named for his sister. The Race Committee originally awarded the trophy to the "youngest skipper" aboard a "winning" sloop. The recipient had to actually be in command during at least one race in which the sloop finished "in the money". This tradition continued for most of 20 years.

Because Friendship Sloops seem to stay in the same family for many years, and the birth rate of sloop owners with eligible family members was in a decline, the rules were changed in the early 1990's to the "youngest crew member aboard a racing sloop", with a year's warning given to those present at the regatta to plan any family expansion accordingly. In creating the list of winners and sloops, the "family" aspect of membership in the Friendship Sloop Society becomes apparent. **Tannis** holds the record for the number of times either a youngest skipper or youngest crew member was aboard.

In 1999, the first "next generation" winner was Ben Zuber, at the winning age of 6 weeks. His uncle, Bob Zuber, was a two-time winner as the youngest skipper in 1980 and 1982, while he was still a teenager. Ben was not awarded the trophy at the awards banquet in Rockland, as the previous year's winner had forgotten to bring it back. Thatcher Carter's dad personally delivered the trophy to Ben's dad, Andy Zuber, the next week. He caused quite a stir when he strode into Andy's office bearing the trophy.
