## Annual Regatta Handicaps or A Level Playing-Field

The system of handicapping is widely used in competition to improve the chance of winning by all contestants, experienced and otherwise; golfing being a prominent example. In sailing we use handicapping to produce a level playing-field for all competitors. Our system is generally expressed in terms of "Seconds per Nautical Mile" (S/NM).

For sloops sailing the same course (the same distance), their individual handicaps are applied so that each respective boat is given a credit in term of time, to be applied at the end of the race to its actual time. Finishes are then established at the end of the regatta on the basis of the net time for each sloop that raced the course. Handicap Alley avoids all this.

For our FSS race program, we have been using the system as developed many years ago by our old friend, Cy Hamlin. This system mathematically produces the S/NM but is based on several physical factors for each sloop. Over the years, Dick Salter has been the caretaker of the system. The other half of "the team" that makes the system work is the individual owner/skipper whose responsibility it is to provide Dick with the necessary information. This combination of input to Dick and his subsequent calculations produce the assigned handicap rating for each racing sloop. Of late, the input to Dick has been done initially or whenever the physical factors (such as a full rig or is otherwise bald-headed) change.

Handicap Alley provides a level playing-field by establishing different distances reflected upon each S/NM assigned to a sloop. At least in theory, the system would allow all starting sloops to cross the finish line at the same time, thus allowing for finishers to be known almost immediately. This is accomplished by comparing each sloop's handicap to the largest known handicap in the fleet, so that the difference in ratings is expended over the additional distances sailed within the Alley.

Since the basic course encompasses all the racing marks for a distance of 4 nautical miles per circuit, the faster sloops are sent through Handicap Alley to a further assigned rounding mark that has been calculated to provide the difference between the sloop's handicap and that of the slower sloop.

For example, if Sloop "A" has the largest (slower) assigned handicap rating of S/NM, then Sloop "B" with a faster handicap rating of 675 S/NM must sail an extra distance based upon:

- The time Sloop "A" would sail 4 NM; which would be 4 x 700 or 2,800 seconds.
- Sloop "B" should sail during the 2,800 seconds, a distance of 4.15 NM; which is 2,800 seconds divided by her assigned 675 S/NM.
- Therefore, Sloop "B" will have to sail around her assigned alley mark set 0.075 NM further up the alley. This is 4.15 NM minus 4.00 NM, divided by 2 (half into the alley, half out).

This explains how Handicap Alley marks are assigned. Since the number of marks is limited, sloops are grouped in assigning alley marks.

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## Annual Regatta Handicaps or A Level Playing-Field

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Next, the actual times for all the races during the prior 3 years are not always available for all sloops within each year's fleet. For example, in 2009 some sloops accomplished only 7 races during the three years back to 2009 (out of a possible total of 9), while others had none. Here, missing race times can be estimated based upon similar Hamlin rated sloops by the use of a "Trend Line". Thus, when all sloops' actual S/NM have been plotted against their Hamlin S/NM, a scatter chart can be created. When a straight line is drawn through these plots representing the same differences of points above and below it, it is known as a "Trend Line"

When the Trend Line is expressed by formula, missing times can be estimated for a sloop based upon the similar Hamlin rating. For example, if the Society happened to run but 7 races during the past 3 years:

- A sloop with 7 actual race times would have a total average race time divided by 7.
- For a sloop that had raced 3 times during that same 3-year period, she would have her total raced time, plus 4 times her "Trend Line", divided by 7.
- A sloop with no times (having not raced during the 3 years), would be subject to the "Trend Line" calculation.

As for any adjustments, the above calculation(s) will provide a very reasonable estimate of handicap S/NM. Limiting the "Trend Line" calculations above the average within 1 standard deviation will reduce further excessive allowances. Adjusted handicaps, combined with the Hamlin rating on a 4:1 ratio, will provide the desired level playing field. This ratio will be reviewed for future regattas.

Past race data includes variables, such as wind, tides, sailing skills such that no additional allowances will be taken into consideration.

#### Southwest Harbor - 2009

Miff Lauriat report on the Southwest Harbor Race:

The Southwest Harbor Sloop Race drew a dozen Friendships in 2009. We were delighted to see **Banshee**, **Gaivota** and **Resolute** (the Massachusetts contingent) as well as **Gladiator** and **Phoenix** (the other "away" boats). Local boats **Alice E., Endeavor, Eden, Chrissy, Helen Brooks, Surprise**, and **Salatia** rounded out the field.

All crews enjoyed a sparkling (this year this was RARE) July day with a good solid 8 to 12 knot breeze. As usual, by mutual agreement of the skippers in attendance, the course was a loose circumnavigation of Greenings Island with maximum reaching and running.

Alice E., at age 110 (making her the oldest sloop in the entire fleet) won the honor of "Fastest Sloop in the East". She took the cannon at 1:51:35, over a minute ahead of **Phoenix**. With the last boat finishing merely a half hour later, all sloops completed the 8.5 mile course in under 2.5 hours, leaving plenty of time to join in a post-race get together at Marge and Miff's home.

A hearty thanks to Ralph Stanley, owner and captain of **Seven Girls**, our committee boat. Cannoneer Rodney Flora and Statistician Jill Schoof took a day off from their own sloop, **Wings of the Morning**, to assist with the flawless race committee work.

2010 will be the Southwest Harbor Race's 18th year. We will be hoping that 18 sloops show up!

These awards will be sent by the Maine Community Foundation, 245 Main Street, Ellsworth, ME 04005 to the student and their school in December, 2009 for their second semester expenses. All donations to the Friendship Memorial Scholarship Fund are fully tax-deductible to the extent allowed by law.

The trustees sent letters to all homeowners in the town to solicit donations to be invested so that scholarship to Friendship students can be continued in the future. 700 letters were mailed in the end of August. As of November 9, 2009, 85 responses had brought in \$5,715. In addition, memorial gifts totaling \$755 and other donations resulted in addition \$8,733 to the Trust Fund. Memorial gifts were received for Constance Pratt, Holt "Jack" Vibber, Delores Smith, Richard "Dick" Lozier, and Marguerite Sylvester, a former teacher in the Friendship Village School and historian of the town.

As of November 11, 2009, the Friendship Memorial Scholarship Fund had \$81,990.38 before disbursement of the scholarship awards listed above. The trustees continue to solicit funds. We thank you, members of the Friendship Sloop Society, for your continued support of this fund, which was voted into existence at your annual meeting in 1967. You can all be proud of what you began, and can rest assured that these scholarships will continue for many years to come.

## Advertising in the 2010 Yearbook

We have spent a lot of time this fall and early part of the winter discussing ad rates. After much discussion it was determined that we would continue to publish the yearbook in color. We all felt that adding color to the yearbook greatly improved the look and feel. The advertising revenue not only pays for the yearbook printing and distribution, but also helps to keep fees low for the Annual Homecoming and Regatta each summer. So, the question of how to cover the added expense of color and still bring in enough money to pay for the yearbook itself took priority. We have been able to maintain the number of ads each year, but getting more ads is challenging. We seem to lose some but gain others with a net result staying approximately even. So, how to cover the expense? As we sat thinking about our options we continued to come back to an increase in ad costs. While none of us wanted to increase the cost of ads as we understand that the economy has and is continuing to affect us all, we also realized that we have not had an increase in advertising rates in many years. It was with this thought that the Executive Committee made the decision to increase advertising rates.

In order to cover the expenses of the yearbook we determined that rates would increase by approximately 7%. The breakdown is as follows:

Full page – back cover: \$530 Full page: \$420 ½ page: \$235 1/3 page: \$170 ¼ page: \$130 1/6 page: \$105

This was the 1st year the yearbook was produced in color thanks to Wayne and Kirsten. Everyone agreed that the yearbook looked awesome in color so we will continue with that format in future years. #### Yearbook Advertising / 50th book: Kirsten Cronin

To cover the cost of the yearbook being printed in color, Kirsten stated that they were going to increase the cost of the ads 5-10% for 2010. #### 50th Annual Regatta in Rockland: Kirsten Cronin

The goal of the FSS is to get 50 boats to Rockland in 2010. This is a very challenging endeavor but could be possible. She has asked the members at the meeting to commit to bringing their boats as well as convincing their friends to bring theirs. Penny Richards has designed postcards to mail out to the membership about the 50th regatta. Wayne and Kirsten are working with the local people to gain access to other docks to keep the cost down. If we can keep the end of the float open, the cost would continue to be \$1,000. More news of the 50th regatta will follow as we get closer to the date.

#### **50th Book**: Kirsten Cronin

Kirsten passed around a rough copy of the book to show everyone what she plans to do. She has asked the membership to sign up for the book now and pay \$40 (pre-sell) to cover the cost of printing the book. It will be a hard cover, coffee table size book. She stated that if you do not have a picture of your boat in it yet, to get it to her as well as an article about your boat. She hopes to have the book done by the Rockland regatta.

If you go to fss.org there is a link to a questionnaire about your boat and its history for the 50th anniversary book. Please fill it out and mail it back to Kirsten ASAP.

#### 50th Regatta:

We will need a bigger tent, probably 40 X 60 or 40 x 80 for 2010 which will cost \$400 more than last year. We will need more tables and chairs which is approximately \$100 more. The Saturday dinner will be done the same in 2010 except not using Amateos and we will go else where for the salads and pasta. Peter and Nancy Toppan did a great job setting up in 2009 and we will be looking for volunteers in 2010 to help again. We will need more help because of the need for more tables, chairs, food to cook. We will have a volunteer sheet before and during Rockland for people to sign up to help.

### Newsletter/Website/Registrar: John Wojcik

The newsletters will be printed 2 times again this year. John thanked all who have given materials and if anyone has any ideas for the newsletter to contact John. The website continues to be active with about 2200 different people looking at it each month. The biggest hit on the website is the "sloops for sale" list.

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## **Friendship Sloop Society Annual Meeting**

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As far as the registrar goes, John took the effort to contact everyone who was thought to own sloops who were not members. There are 84 sloops who are not members so the question is: do they still own them, and do the sloops still exist. Many telephone numbers did not work and mailing addresses were invalid. John stated that there are 130 sloops in Maine and New Hampshire so why can't we get 50 boats in Rockland?

#### **Publicity Report**: Nate Jones

Nate stated that they had reporters on **Sarah Mead** during the Rockland regatta and they had some good articles. He is now in the process of contacting national magazines and publications to get the press release out for the 50th regatta. He has asked for ideas to where to get the press releases published besides known ones like **Downeast**, **Woodenboat**, etc. It was stated that **Offshore** has changed its name to **New England Boating**. Anyone with ideas should email Nate at captains@sailmuscongus.com. Kirsten stated that she knows the owners of **Maine Boats & Harbors** and will talk to them about doing something for the 50th.

#### Trophies/Awards: Penny Richards

Penny proposed that we replace our trophies with a wood-laser engraved plaque stating what the plague is for with an engraving of a sloop on the front. On the back would be 20 or so plaques to list the winners for year to year. She proposed to leave the State of Maine trophy as is and not replace the non-racing trophies. Just replace the Division 1 and Division 2 racing trophies. The cost of the plaques is \$60 each and the cost is reflected in the 2010 budget report. She suggested collecting the trophies in Rockland and then auctioning them off at the Annual Meeting. John asked if we should have different artwork on each plague to make each unique. Caroline Zuber suggested that we price out half models instead. Bill Zuber stated that there are many members who can and are willing to make trophies at no cost to the society. Bill Whitney stated that you have to keep the size of the trophy in mind for those who are sailing home after the races. After lengthy discussion, it was suggested that we table this discussion until the next executive board meeting and have a decision by the 3rd executive meeting.

Jack Cronin made a motion to pay the schedule of donations as listed; Dave Richards seconded that motion and it passed unanimously.

**Treasurer's Report:** Greg Merrill (See summary on page 4)

Greg had a summary list of revenue and expenses, a 3 year summary of what the society did and the 2010 budget. He stated that we lost \$2,800 in 2009 due to the economy and increased costs of everything. For the 2010 budget there will be

extra expenses for the 50th regatta such as the tent, tables, chairs, dockage (possibly), skippers gifts and plaques, etc. He stated that the yearbook did not make as much of a profit as 2009, but that was due to the fact that it was printed in color. He stated that the Chandlery had an increased revenue for 2009. He stated that we are looking to break even on the 50th book this year and then make money the following years. He put in an extra \$500 for dockage fees to help with the cost. He increased the trophy account from \$500 to \$1000 to cover the cost of new trophies and brass plaques. He also stated that we cut into our savings by about \$1,400 for 2010. The 50th book should be at no risk to the society and we are pre-selling them. There will be 100 copies made. Kirsten stated that she wanted all information for the book by February 1st so she can put it together. Nancy Toppan suggested printing the yearbook registry at the end of the book. Kirsten stated that Marcia went through all the yearbooks for articles so Kirsten did not have to do that. Motion was made and seconded to accept 2010 budget as printed -- passed unanimously.

#### Nominating committee: Bill Whitney

Bill stated that on his committee is Bill Finch, Carol Rose, Charlie Burnham with Maria as his extension. He has asked for suggestions for the next Vice Commodore.

August 7th is the Friendship chowder race which is a fun time and she invited any Friendships that wanted to come to show up. She said that the Friendship Memorial Stone is being taken care of by Philip Pratt and it now looks wonderful.

Kirsten suggested that we invite the original families of Friendship to our 50th regatta.

Noel March is in contact with the governor of Maine and will see what he can do to get him to the regatta.

There will be a blessing of the fleet by members of the town of Friendship.

With no further business, motion made and seconded to adjourn meeting.

# Sloop Racing Revival Focuses Eyes and Lights on Friendship "Welcome Lights" to Glow Friday Night; Races Saturday

The following article appeared in the local Friendship area newspaper before the first homecoming in 1961. We'll have the results article in the next edition of the newsletter

The coastal area will focus its eyes and lights on Friendship and its harbor to the "East'ard" tomorrow and Saturday on which latter day "Sloop Day" featuring a 16 mile race will be held.

#### The Course

The race will start on a line between Red Nun buoy #8 off Martin's Point and George Morrill's boat anchored off Long Island. A brass cannon of the War of 1812 will fire the starting blast.

The course leads over towards Killick Stone and Thief Islands, past Black Island to Thompson Island; back between Crane and Franklin Islands where handicap buoys will be picked up in open waters and sloops will head for the finish line in Friendship harbor, details of which will be announced over the loud speaker system.

In addition to the sloops there will be races for all sailboats and outboards in three classes: Up to 15 years of age and 10 horse-power motors and open class; above 25 horsepower motors. Al Roberts handled the entries with trophies for each class.

Bernard MacKenzie, president of the Friendship Sloop Society, is on his way to Friendship in a Friendship Sloop, flying a 15-foot "homeward bound" flag in recognition of the race.

President MacKenzie has informed Herold Jones, race secretary, that he is being followed by a power boat from Bath.

Aboard the power boat is Newark, NJ Evening News reporter, Phil Stowell, who has recently completed a series of articles on Sloop Day for some New York papers. Mr. Stowell is on a photography assignment for Life Magazine. He will take pictures of the race and of the events featured in Friendship.

The race is scheduled for 11 AM Saturday and will last for six hours. During this time spectators will have many activities in which they may participate. Scheduled for the day are the following events:

Friday evening at sundown - Friendship becomes a reality. Visiting sloops and craft will be at anchor. Homes will be lighted, especially homes facing the harbor. Boats with lights mounted will wind their way among the craft. Those on shore will carry a light of some kind as folks mingle with neighbors and visitors.

### The Friendship Sloop

The Friendship Sloop was originally built as a work boat, a fisherman's boat designed for speed, weather and ease of handling. They were inexpensive to build. A 28-footer cost \$799 in 1899. Today's cost would run 10 to 20 times the 1900 cost

The Morse family of Friendship, particularly Wilbur Morse, became so identified with the sloops that the words "Morse" and "Friendship Sloop" are particularly synonymous. Wilbur Morse has an almost uncontested claim to have built the first Friendship Sloop. In 1929, 500 sloops had been built.
