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## Friendship Sloop Book Update

As you read this newsletter, the draft of the new Friendship sloop book, *Lasting Friendships*, is complete and is just starting the editing stage. We expect to be editing and adjusting the layout until May, when we hope to be ready to send the digital files to the printer.

As was reported at the Annual Meeting, the first part of the book, which covers the history of Friendship sloops, was intended to be 50 pages long. What we discovered was that there was a great deal of material to cover, and some of it had never been previously published by the Society, so it now looks as though the first part of the book will be about 80 pages long.

The second part of the book, the catalog of sloops, represents the most comprehensive listing of surviving sloops that we could collect and verify. More than one hundred sloop owners have sent us information, confirming the individual specifics of their vessels, sharing with us stories and pictures. The book committee would like to extend our thanks to all of you who have participated in this project.

It has been particularly rewarding to hear from so many members from literally all over the world who are excited about contributing to the book. In some cases original owners or builders of "lost" sloops (vessels that we believe are still out there, but whereabouts unknown) have contacted us to try and fill in details about those missing boats.

This winter the Book Committee will make some final decisions that will determine the actual number of pages, which will in turn determine the cost of the book. We have committed to a hard cover format, but are discussing producing a paperback version as well, designed to have a lower retail price and reach a wider audience.

There is a great deal of technical work to be done before we can go to the printer, but we are optimistic that we can have the book available for summer 2014. We are planning to have books available to members at the various raft-ups and gatherings leading up to the homecoming in Rockland.

## A Perfect Day for Slooping With Friends

SOUTHWEST HARBOR — Favorable winds powered thirteen Friendship Sloops on their race around Greening's Island for the 21st annual Southwest Harbor Rendezvous of the Friendship Sloop Society.

The 33-foot **Hieronymous**, sailed by skipper Joe Nielsen, was first over the line, with Scott Martin on the 25-foot Pemaquid-design **Eden** a close second. **Banshee**, also a 25-foot Pemaquid, took third, sailed by John and Carole Wojcik. **Banshee** is two-time champion of the Friendship Sloop regatta in Rockland.

"It was a perfect day for slooping with a lovely little southerly breeze," said organizer Miff Lauriat. "In the spirit of our easygoing event, the race committee elected to eliminate the weather mark to ensure that folks who needed to be back ashore sooner rather than later would not be thwarted by the light air. The idea is, the race is supposed to be short enough to be fun for all."

The signal cannon on the committee boat went off as planned 10 minutes before the start of the race, and again 5 minutes before, but encountered technical difficulties when it came time to start, and wouldn't fire. "Undaunted, the resourceful race committee finally yelled, "go!" said Mr. Lauriat. A game of "telephone" followed, with skippers yelling "boom!" or "We're starting!" to each other on down the line.

Banshee "shot off to an early and commanding lead," said Mr. Lauriat. The local charter boats Alice E., Helen Brooks, and Surprise are often at or near the front of the pack, but got a slower start than some of the smaller, lighter craft. "As the fleet bunched together again on the backside of Greening's, local knowledge, lady luck, and topsails made it anybody's race," he said. Coming around Sand Point, Eden took the lead and tacked early for the finish.

**Hieronymous** came from another angle and hit the finish line just before **Eden**. Mr. Martin on **Eden** was thrilled with second place. "Miracles do happen!" he said. "We're not an underdog any more!"

**Eden** has a new mast this year built by Elk Spar and Boat Shop in Bar Harbor, and new sails.

These graceful, gaff-rigged vessels are a design that was common in the early 20th century on the Maine coast for lobstering. Some were also used to harpoon tuna in the Gulf of Maine. One of the group, the **Alice E.**, dates from that era. She was built in 1899.

Many of the sloops in the race were built on Mount Desert Island. The wooden boats **Peregrine** and **Endeavor** were built in the 1970s by Ralph Stanley. Fiberglass Friendship sloops including **Osprey, Banshee**, **Gaviota**, and **Salatia** were built by Jarvis Newman.

The Rendezvous has always been an easygoing race and a family event. This year Mr. Lauriat and his wife Marjory Russakoff were pleased to have their entire family aboard. "It had been years since we'd been together with both adult children on **Salatia**," said Ms. Russakoff. Some crew members continued a tradition of water balloon warfare. After crossing the finish

line, cameras were stowed below decks and crews from **Eden** and **Surprise** did battle with their remaining balloons.

## **Islands**

#### Featured Island: Marshall Island

Appearing for the first time in this issue is a new series about favorite islands. We welcome your input, articles and suggestions about islands you have sailed to and particularly enjoyed for any reason, such as great hiking, a beautiful anchorage, exciting wildlife, best lobster roll, challenging transit; anything.

We sailed to uninhabited Marshall Island after leaving Southwest Harbor, at the recommendation of Scott Martin, Miff Lauriat and several other local sailors. Located between Swans Island and Isle au Haut, it has several potentially good anchorages. We chose the northeast facing cove protected by tiny Ringtown Island, in part because there is a pier and float for easy access. Calm, settled weather is essential for any stopover on this remote and exposed island.

Once ashore, we picked up a brochure with a trail map at the small kiosk, and started walking, because that really is what one does on Marshall. It had once been a summer retreat, and there are some old foundations, even an overgrown gravel airstrip in the middle of the island. It is now owned and maintained by the Maine Coast Heritage Trust.

At 985 acres, Marshall is reportedly the largest undeveloped island off the east coast and it is massive! It could easily take half a day to get all the way around it. The 10 miles of trails are well marked with that typical Maine island mix of roots, rocks, moss, and flat stretches. The landscape is dramatic and varied, with open meadows to the north and hilly, tree covered terrain, ledge and wetlands elsewhere. We were rewarded with great views of nearby islands, cobble beaches loaded with flotsam, and a profusion of tranquility and solitude. There are two recently installed hand cranked water pumps inland, a bit hard to find but producing cool, sweet water. Lovely Sand Cove on the eastern shore has several stunning, steep sand beaches and is also a popular anchorage.

On departure, we did haul up some impressive strands of kelp on the anchors, particularly at the eastern end of our cove. Loons and dolphins were seen in abundance, and a perched bald eagle eyed us warily the next day as we headed into a glassy calm morning, southwest toward Isle au Haut.

## **2013 Annual Report**

The Friendship Memorial Scholarship Fund has had a very rewarding year as our goal of reaching \$100,000 in the fund by 2017 was actually attained in mid 2013! We do owe a lot of this to the stock market increases as the value of the fund managed through the Maine Community Foundation (MCF) climbed by over \$8,000 this year to date through September month end. We still continue to have strong financial support from donors like the Friendship Sloop Society. We want to strongly thank the Friendship Sloop Society for creating this opportunity in 1967 for the children of Friendship, giving them the opportunity to get financial support for advanced educational endeavors. The support the Scholarship Fund has received from the Friendship Sloop Society since the fund's inception, through today has been exceptional, and we emphatically thank the Friendship Sloop Society for that continued support!!

As referred to in last year's report, the trustees of the fund are endeavoring to continue to work their way through the records discovered last year by Caroline Zuber, left to Caroline by Betty Roberts concerning the history of Scholarships awarded from 1967 and going forward. After analysis and organization we will have a historical picture of scholarship awards made from 1967 through the current year.

The Friendship Memorial Scholarship Fund is the oldest Scholarship Fund in Friendship. It is also the largest financially, offering more opportunities for children in Friendship to advance their educations. To maintain that stature the trustees of the fund are investigating ways to improve awareness of the fund, channel more funds into the "For Distribution" column, and plan and administer on a timely basis (every few years) local fund raisers (such as the very successful fund raiser developed and executed by Bill and Caroline Zuber a couple of years ago). More planning on building "principal" as well as "for distribution" will continue to insure the existence of the maximum dollars available to students in Friendship wishing to further advance their education.

# NOAA to End Printing Paper Nautical Charts

NOAA-certified Print-on-Demand partners will continue to sell paper charts

NOAA's Office of Coast Survey, which creates and maintains the nation's suite of a thousand nautical charts of U.S. coastal waters, has announced major changes ahead for mariners and others who use nautical charts. Starting April 13, 2014, the federal government will no longer print traditional lithographic (paper) nautical charts.

Most mariners now use Print-on-Demand nautical charts that are up-to-date to the moment of printing. These charts will continue to be available from NOAA-certified printers.

Since 1862, those lithographic nautical charts—available in marine shops and other stores—have been printed by the U.S. government and sold to the public by commercial vendors. The decision to stop production is based on several factors: the declining demand for lithographic charts, the increasing use of digital and electronic charts, and federal budget realities.

"With the end of traditional paper charts, our primary concern continues to be making sure that boaters, fishing vessels, and commercial mariners have access to the most accurate, up-to-date nautical charts in a format that works well for them," said Capt. Shep Smith, chief of Coast Survey's Marine Chart Division. "Fortunately, advancements in computing and mobile technologies give us many more options than was possible years ago."

NOAA will continue to create and maintain other forms of nautical charts, including the increasingly popular Print-on-Demand (POD) charts, updated paper charts available from NOAA-certified printers. NOAA electronic navigational charts (NOAA ENC®) and raster navigational charts (NOAA RNC®), used in a variety of electronic charting systems, are also updated weekly and are available for free download from the Coast Survey website. NOAA announced a new product as well: full-scale PDF (Portable Digital Format) nautical charts, available for free download on a trial basis.

The world of navigation is benefiting from advances in technology, Smith explained. He said that NOAA will consult with chart users and private businesses about the future of U.S. navigation, especially exploring the use of NOAA charts as the basis for new products.

### **New Editor for the Newsletter**

## **Annual Meeting Report**

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the Annual Meeting and one in the spring as the season is beginning. We send out approximately 220 newsletters for each mailing.

• John is asking for a new editor for the newsletter. He commented that he would be happy to split the job, having a new editor gather material while he continues to be the "publisher", having the newsletter printed and mailed.

#### Book Committee - Ted Walsh

- Ted reported that the Book Committee has 14 members and has held several meetings since January 2013. He outlined several of the issues being considered by the committee:
- The biggest issue is what do we leave out because we have volumes of information.
- History will be a major part of the book.
- The sloop catalog continues to be a problem because sloop owners are not sending in their information.
- Ralph Stanley has been most helpful to Ted in contributing information of all types.
- Ted outlined the schedule for the Book.
- Sloop information is due by 12/31/13, an absolute deadline. If there is no new information, the committee will publish information on record.
- There will be four months of editing all copy.
- The committee's goal is to go to print in June 2014, and have the book available at the 2014 Rockland Homecoming.
- We will be using "Lighting Source" as the printer, a division of Ingram Publishing.
- The Society will be the publisher of record, with the book having an ISBN number and listed where bookstores can find it easily to order stock.
- "Lasting Friendships" is the working title, probably with a subtitle.

### 2013 At Rockland

From a racing and cruising point of view, the 2013 Rockland Rendezvous was very nearly picture perfect. The weather cooperated with our on-the-water schedule to-a-tee, providing us with little more than isolated afternoon thunderstorms in the area - - - very isolated, none of which paid us any visits - - - during all three days between Thursday, July 18th and Saturday, the 20th. The predicted SE to SW breezes developed each day in time to allow us to get our cruising schedule, for those who wanted to participate, and our race starting sequences off in an orderly fashion during all three days. Additionally, these conditions prevailed on Saturday morning, allowing us to get our parade of sloops underway, ably lead by our Commodore(s), Bill & Kathy Whitney aboard their very handsome sloop **Gaivota**. In turn, this allowed us to start Saturday's race "as published"!
